# **Design or Physical Value**

### Architecture

95 Henderson Avenue is a two-and-one-half storey wood frame gable-front house clad in red brick with a stone foundation and a rear chimney. The front façade features bargeboard with simple detailing, segmental arched openings

with sash windows, decorative brick voussoirs and a one-storey closed porch clad in rough cast stucco. A one and one-half storey section of the building is visible to the rear, clad in rough cast stucco. The property also contains a detached garage.

The gable-front house is a common building type found across Ottawa and is widely seen throughout Ontario. This building type may also be described as a front gable cottage or as a gable-end-to-street. Gable-front houses have a street-facing gable roof, simple form, consistent window openings, a rectangular footprint and typically feature an off-centre door and an entry porch or veranda. Although the design interpretation is vernacular, many


gable-front homes were influenced by Classic Revival and Gothic Revival designs. Gable-front houses frequently appear in clusters with a range of materials and details.

95 Henderson is one of several gable-front houses along Henderson Avenue, including 94 Henderson Avenue and 102 Henderson Avenue. Like many vernacular dwellings, 95 Henderson Avenue was incrementally built, starting with one storey and one-and-one-half storey wood frame sections in the 1890s. By 1912, a two-and-one-half storey addition was constructed in front of the earlier structure, clad in brick veneer. This front addition featured an open veranda across the front façade. By 1948, the veranda was replaced with a closed porch clad in rough-cast stucco. Sections to the rear were similarly clad in rough-cast stucco.

Although 95 Henderson Avenue is an example of a gable-front house, and the gable-front house is a common building type, replacement windows and the loss of the veranda, among several other minor alterations, diminish the architectural integrity of this simple house.

#### **Date of Construction:**

It is estimated that the one- and one-half storey structure was initially constructed on the lot between 1892 to 1894. A two- and one-half storey front addition was constructed between 1901 and 1912, clad in brick veneer.


95 Henderson Avenue has direct associations with several families who owned and lived in the house, namely the Davidsons and the Coughlins. The history of occupants is representative of Sandy Hill – many residents of the neighbourhood were locally-known individuals who contributed to Ottawa's development and held roles connected to Parliament. These associations do not appear to be significant.

95 Henderson Avenue was occupied for the first thirty years by the Davidson family. Land records indicate that Sarah A. Davidson took possession of the subject property in 1893. Around that time, a one- and one-half storey building was constructed. In 1895, the Ottawa City Directory lists Robt Davidson living at the house, numbered 83 Henderson Avenue. The house number changed to 95 Henderson Avenue by 1899. The Davidson family appears to be in possession of the house when the red brick portion was constructed.

The Davidson household included several family members:

- Sarah A. Davidson. Born 1851, spouse of Robert H.
- Katie E. M. Huckell. Born 1876, niece of Robert H. and Sarah A. Married George E. Currie in 1906.

 Robert J. Davidson. Born 1883, nephew of Robert H. and Sarah A. Enlisted 1914, received Military Cross at Battle of Vimy Ridge.

In 1923, the house at 95 Henderson Avenue was advertised for both rent and sale. In 1924, the property was granted to Mabel E. Coughlin and is associated with the Coughlin family until 1957. There were at least four members of the Coughlin family:

- Thomas J Coughlin. Born 1871 (est. Chapeau, QC). Spouse of Mabel.
   Dominion Legislative Representative of the Brotherhood of Railway
   Trainmen. After living in Vancouver, moved to Ottawa in 1920.
- Mabel Coughlin. Spouse of Thomas J. Involved in fundraising and benevolent work with the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen.
- Jean Baird nee Coughlin. Child of Thomas J and Mabel.
- Thomas (Tom) Coughlin. Child of Thomas J and Mabel.

The property changed hands at the end of the 1950s and had several later owners and occupants including the Morin family and the Phillips family.

The earliest iterations of the house, built in the 1890s, were part of the first efforts to develop Henderson Avenue for residential use. Most houses on Henderson Avenue between Laurier and Somerset were built in a three- or four-year period at the end of the 1890s, continuing development of the former Colonel By Estate.

Although the building offers general information about Sandy Hill's building stock and the way of life of its occupants, research into the building has not revealed any specific information that would contribute to an understanding of the community or local culture.

# **Community Character**

95 Henderson Avenue is located in Sandy Hill, an established neighbourhood located between the Rideau Canal and the Rideau River, south of Rideau Street and north of Highway 417, including the campus of the University of Ottawa.

The area is characterized by vernacular residential buildings from the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century. Most of the original street grid layout of Sandy Hill dating back to the late 1860s remains intact.

The Sandy Hill neighbourhood contains the Sandy Hill Cultural Heritage Character Area and eight Heritage Conservation Districts: Besserer-Wurtumberg, Daly Avenue, King Edward Avenue, Russell-Range, Sandy Hill West, Stewart-Wilbrod, Sweetland Avenue, and Wilbrod-Laurier.

One of several gable-front houses on Henderson Avenue, and one of dozens of gable-front houses in the Sandy Hill Cultural Heritage Character Area, the subject property contributes to and supports the cultural heritage character of Sandy Hill, however, it does not appear to be significant in defining the area's character. The property contributes to the consistent streetscape along Henderson Avenue, punctuated with green front lawns and red brick buildings. Its materials and built form are commonly found in the area.

### Context

Like many detached houses in the area, 95 Henderson Avenue has general historical and visual links to its surroundings. Overall, the relationship between the subject property and its broader context does not significantly expand staff's understanding of the area.

The property is historically linked to its surroundings as part of the gradual the development of the By Estate in the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century. It is one of several gable-front or red brick houses along Henderson Avenue built in this era,

moderately contributing to a cohesive streetscape along Henderson Avenue that contains other low-rise redbrick buildings with similar heights, setbacks and design elements.

The building's gablefront roofline, red brick cladding and

stone foundation provide a historical and visual connection to similar buildings in the area through these common vernacular features.
