4.1 Transportation Committee Terms of Reference

Ms Caitlin Salter MacDonald, Manager, Council and Committee Services, Office of the City Clerk, and Ms Vivi Chi, Director, Transportation Planning, Planning, Real Estate and Economic Development Department, responded to questions from Councillor Johnson related to the Committee's draft Terms of Reference and how they relate to the Transportation Master Plan, to be considered by the Committee later this year. MOTION Nº TRC 2023 - 01-02

Moved by Vice-Chair C. Kitts:

WHEREAS on February 23, 2022, Council approved a motion to temporarily close Wellington Street between Bank Street and Elgin Street until the end of 2022 and that the road not re-open until such a time that a report is brought forward to Transportation Committee; and

WHEREAS the IPD sent to Council on January 17, 2023, indicated that staff will bring forward a report to Transportation Committee once the Traffic Study that is set to begin shortly has been completed; and

WHEREAS Traffic Services conducted a review of traffic impacts due to the closure, and concluded that the current closure is manageable based on 2022 traffic volumes, however, have observed some impacts of detoured traffic on the road network in the area; and

WHEREAS the return to the office of Federal Government employees will lead to increased pedestrian, cycling and traffic volumes in the downtown core and along with planned major construction projects in the area, will lead to increase congestion; and

WHEREAS the City has received requests from residents, businesses and visitors to re-open Wellington Street; and

WHEREAS the increased congestion and impacts of detoured traffic can increase the number of potential risks to pedestrians and cyclists; and

WHEREAS opening Wellington Street will provide additional capacity for vehicles travelling in the downtown core, thereby reducing the impact of the return to work of Federal Employees and planned lane reductions as a result of construction in the area; and

WHEREAS staff can currently, in consultation with Ottawa Police Services, Ottawa Fire Services and Ottawa Paramedic Services, choose to temporarily close Wellington Street and other city streets for special events, security reasons or to allow for lawful protests;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that in consultation with Ottawa Police Services, Ottawa Fire Services and Ottawa Paramedic Services, Wellington Street between Elgin and Bank Street be reopened to all traffic as soon as it is operationally feasible as determined by the Director of Traffic Services but no sooner than March 1st, 2023 to allow for the replacement and installation of traffic infrastructure in the area; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that staff explore options for temporary road closures of Wellington Street between Elgin Street and Bank Street during the summer of 2023 for special events and community programming or for the safety and wellbeing of the residents of Ottawa; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the General Managers of Planning, Real Estate and Economic Development and Public Works continue ongoing discussions with Federal officials regarding the potential of a redefined Parliamentary Precinct, with appropriate consultation with local businesses and residents; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that staff ensure that appropriate easements, city infrastructure, future transportation plans, land valuation process, impact of any changes to bus routes on the capacity of downtown street including accesses and entrances to O-Train stations and any potential land exchange are considered in all discussions with federal officials; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that staff continue to work with Public Service and Procurement Canada on finalizing a traffic study and report back to Transportation Committee and Council in the first quarter of 2024 or as soon as the study is complete including an update on ongoing discussions, recommendations and any requests resulting from the negotiation framework; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED staff regularly liaise with the mayor's office and the local Councillor to identify opportunities to increase programming and seek out partnerships to improve the beautification and animation of the Wellington Street.

- 8. Inquiries
 - 8.1 TRC 23-01 Windrow Snow Removal

Snow windrows present an inconvenience to residents across the city and are particularly difficult for both seniors and people with disabilities to clear. While other Canadian municipalities have experimented with or are actively involved with windrow clearing programs, the City of Ottawa does not currently provide this service. Instead, the City has created both the Snow-Go and the Snow-Go Assist programs that connect seniors and people with disabilities with reputable contractors and provides moderate financial assistance for those considered low-income. While these programs are helpful, residents have been asking the city to consider a more robust windrow removal program.

- Can staff provide a detailed overview of the uptake on both the Snow-Go and Snow-Go Assist program? This should include the volume of residents that take advantage of the program, the cost to administer the program, and the annual amount of subsidies provided to eligible residents.
- 2. Can staff provide an estimated cost as well as resource requirement for the following scenarios:

Municipality clears windrows from driveways for seniors and those with disability

- a) Tax supported city-wide; service provided to seniors and those with disability only
- Service provided to seniors and those with disability based upon full cost user pay system
- c) Service provided to seniors and those with disability based upon a partial cost recovery system
- 8.2 TRC 23-02 Comparison of Snow Removal Service Standards
 Please provide a comparison of the snow removal service standards for
 the City of Ottawa and other Canadian municipalities with comparable size
 and weather, including service response times, areas of responsibility (i.e.
