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REPORT RECOMMENDATION

That the Planning Committee recommend Council approve amendments to the Addressing By-law, as detailed in Document 1.

RECOMMANDATIONS DU RAPPORT

BACKGROUND

The naming of streets and numbering of properties are authorities provided to the City under the *Municipal Act*, 2001 and are exercised through By-law 2014-78. Proper regulation of street names and numbering is crucial for providing clear wayfinding for residents, businesses, first responders (Ottawa Fire Services, Ottawa Paramedic Services and the Ottawa Police Service), service providers (gas, hydro, Canada Post, couriers, etc.) and visitors.

The current Addressing By-law has been in effect since 2014. Significantly, the by-law consolidated two previously separate by-laws for street naming and civic numbering of private roads and public streets. The combined by-law represented a significant step in aligning addressing regulations into supporting the objectives of the Official Plan and for building a City process that is consistent with stakeholder needs and expectations.

On April 24, 2019, Council approved a By-law Review Framework, which establishes key components and requirements that will guide departments in reviewing, updating, and developing the City's public-facing and regulatory by-laws. The By-law Review Work Plan (2019-2022) sets out the regulatory projects and by-law reviews scheduled for this Term of Council. The projects and reviews approved were prioritized based on Council-approved criteria. As part of the approved work plan, the then named, Planning, Infrastructure & Economic Development Department committed to reviewing the Addressing By-law.

DISCUSSION

An initial step of the review was conducting a municipal scan of peer municipalities to assess the extent to which Ottawa's Addressing By-law reflects best practices and to determine what areas for improvements are warranted. Six mid-to large-size comparable municipalities were chosen for the review: Calgary, Hamilton, Markham, Mississauga, Richmond Hill and Toronto.

The scan found that there are significantly different municipal addressing approaches. Some municipalities principally regulate addressing and naming through policy and staff produced guiding documents. Although expecting to establish an addressing by-law in

2022, Hamilton currently does not have a comparable addressing by-law. Instead, it relies on established policies and procedures to guide naming procedures. Conversely, municipalities such as Richmond Hill and Toronto had robust by-laws, coupled with comprehensive administrative guidelines. Compared to the peer municipalities, staff have determined that the City's Addressing By-law is comparable and overall does well in providing practical wayfinding regulation, and ease of use for stakeholders.

Therefore, only minor amendments are proposed in the report, as detailed in Document 1. These changes focus on updating wording with current terminology, updating provisions to match best practices, and removing unnecessary administrative processes to allow staff flexibility on basic processes without requiring a by-law amendment.

Document 1 - Details of the proposed amendments to the Building By-law

Proposed amendments to the Addressing By-law, as amended, with the general intent of the following:

- 1. Deleting the word "Director" throughout the By-law and substitute with the words "Chief Building Official;
- 2. Amend Section 1 by striking out the definition of "Director";
- 3. Amend Section 1 by inserting the following definition ""Chief Building Official" means the person in the office of Chief Building Official, or authorized delegate;"
- 4. Delete the number "2005-439" immediately following the words "Permanent Signs on Private Property By-law" under the definition for "ground sign" and replace with the numbers 2016-326;
- 5. Delete the words "on the MAP database (or any replacement database or similar system)" as contained under the definition of "Index of Streets"
- 6. Amend Section 2 by deleting the number "2005-439" immediately following the words "Permanent Signs on Private Property By-law" under the definition for "ground sign" and replace with the numbers "2016-326";
- 7. Amend Section 9 by deleting the word "MAP" and replacing with the words "City of Ottawa Mapping"
- 8. Amend Section 30 by deleting the word "MAP" and replacing with the words "City of Ottawa Mapping"
- 9. Amend Section 2(b) of Schedule B by replacing "89 x 89 cm" with "8.9 cm x 8.9 cm"
