- Our thoughts and prayers go to this family and loved ones, as well as his policing family.
- He will be greatly missed.
- I'd like us to observe a short moment of silence out of respect for the Constable and his family.

### **Chief Recruitment**

- Last week, the Board officially launched the community engagement process for the Chief of Police recruitment.
- The process is being run by Ottawa-based firm Hefid.Solutions.
