RECOMMANDATIONS DU RAPPORT

BACKGROUND

In 2011, the Ottawa Police Service (OPS) assumed responsibility from the Ottawa Police Services Board relating to rewards issued to the public for information leading to the arrest and prosecution of persons responsible for identified unsolved homicides and other major investigations.

A policy was put in place which outlined the guidelines associated with reward monies and the terms and conditions for payment.

DISCUSSION

In April 2016, a single reward poster* was issued by Collisions Reconstruction Unit in relation to the ongoing and unsolved Hit and Run death of Michael Morland that

occurred on August 11, 2013, at 5:00am on Frank Kenny Road, in Ottawa. This case is still unsolved.

*(Rewards were offered by CrimeStoppers in 2016, but that falls outside of this Policy).

EXISTING POLICY

As per the Board's Public Rewards Policy CR-10, the Chief of Police shall report to the Board annually on compliance with the provisions of the policy and on any rewards offered during the reporting period.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

To date, no monies have been paid out under this Policy and as such there is no financial implication.

CONCLUSION

This report is intended to provide the Board with a summary of any reward monies paid to persons who assisted the OPS in the arrest and prosecution of persons responsible for major investigations.

The OPS will continue to consider this investigative avenue in the investigation of unsolved homicides and other major incidents.
