4. EXTENDED SUPERVISED BEACH SEASON

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION AS AMENDED

That Council consider the matter.

The following Motion was put to Council:

WHEREAS the Extended Supervised Beach Season report (ACS2016-COS-PRC-0001) recommends a staggered start and close date for City beach sites; and

WHEREAS, at the Community and Protective Services Committee meeting of February 25, 2016, Members of the Committee noted that all four beach locations would benefit from expanding the supervised beach season by an additional week and directed staff to see if there was a way to bring that option forward within the currently approved operating budget; and

WHEREAS staff is able to recommend that the beach season can be extended to 72 days, from the current 65 days, to remain operational later in August for an additional operating cost of \$31,000 without additional funds from the 2016 approved budget or in subsequent budgets, as follows:

- Staff has identified funding for 2016 from one-time, internal savings in the Parks, Recreation and Culture operating budget resulting from the temporary closure of an outdoor pool that is being replaced;
- Staff is confident the additional funding for the future operating costs in the Parks, Recreation and Culture operating budget can be identified by advancing a portion of the current Service Review process and these results will be reflected in the Department's 2017 Draft budget; and
- Staff in Public Works and Services and in the Public Health Department have advised that they believe the increased costs they will incur that are related to this increase in service can be similarly absorbed;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT City Council approve that the recommended option in the staff report be amended such that the City will provide an additional week of supervision at all four beach locations, with the end of the beach season calculated from the last Sunday in August prior to Labour Day weekend, with the \$31,000 in 2016 to be funded from the one-time savings from the temporary closure of an outdoor pool that is being replaced, as identified in this motion; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the additional operating costs for future years be included in future draft budgets such that any additional pressures will be absorbed through internal savings and efficiencies.

WHEREAS City staff has no concerns with the revisions to the proposed Downtown Rideau BIA boundary expansion;

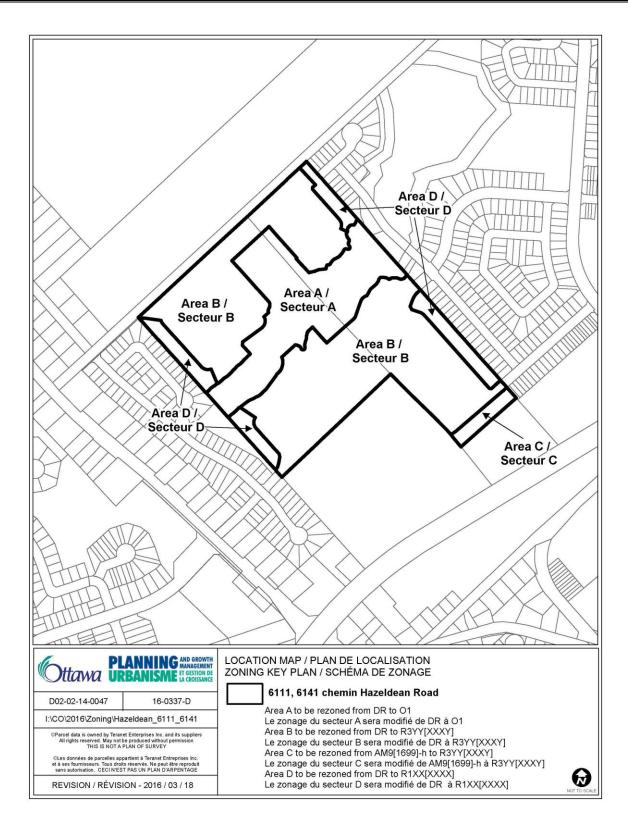

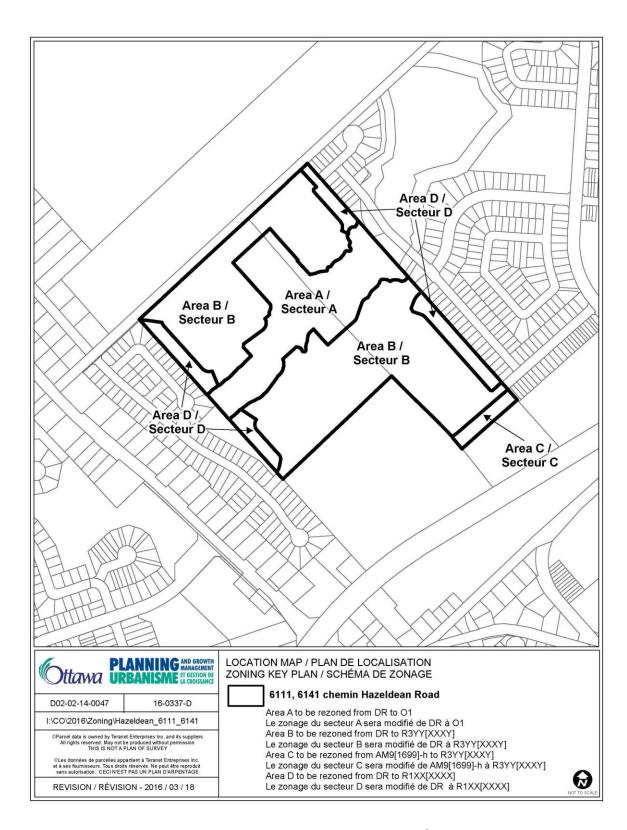

The Sponsor Group will work with the Ward Councillor(s) in the catchment area for each identified community to establish an appropriate spending and resource plan, in consultation with staff Steering Committee consisting of General Managers and other Senior Managers to be identified by the Sponsors Group, and further determine any

- additional funding that may be required over and above any normal operating budgets that would be used to support the development of the revitalization plans for each neighborhood for inclusion in future draft budgets;
- ii. The lead Department identified by the Sponsor Group for each neighborhood revitalization plan will work with the Sponsor Group and the responsible Ward Councillor(s) to develop a project charter for the development of each neighborhood revitalization plan that clearly sets out tasks, deliverables and roles and responsibilities, to be signed by the Sponsor Group, the General Managers of Planning and Growth Management, Parks and Recreation and Community and Social Services and the respective Ward Councillor(s);
- iii. The Sponsor Group will work with each Ward Councillor(s) to facilitate the development of a Neighbourhood Revitalization Plan for each community that will provide a clear roadmap towards successful redevelopment;
- iv. The project timelines for the work for Carlington, Heatherington and Vanier South will be determined by the Sponsor Group;
- v. The Sponsor Group may request support and advice from the City's Boards and Agencies;
- vi. The appropriate General Manager or senior manager will take the appropriate actions to implement the Sponsor Group's direction in accordance with City processes; and
- vii. The Sponsor Group will report on the progress of the Strategic Initiative on an annual basis.

13. MUNICIPAL GREEN FLEET PLAN

Specific to the City of Ottawa Endowment Fund (Ontario Regulation 399/02)

 The addition of wording under clause 4.1 that would specifically allow the City of Ottawa Endowment Fund to invest in a way that would move to the Prudent Investor Standard and away from the prescribed investment highlighted in the Municipal Act.

Specific to the City of Ottawa Internally Managed Funds (Ontario Regulation 399/02)

The addition of a new clause that would specifically allow the City of
Ottawa to invest internally managed funds in a way that would move to the
Prudent Investor Standard and away the prescribed investments
highlighted in the Municipal Act; and

WHEREAS the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), Local Authority Services (LAS), and the Municipal Finance Officers Association of Ontario (MFOA), have long requested that the Prudent Investor Standard apply to all municipal investments that are invested with The One Investment Program, and City of Ottawa staff agrees that, in addition to the existing request that Prudent Investor Standard apply for the City's own Endowment and Internally Managed Funds, there is a benefit to extending that request to also include the One Fund;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT City Council, through the Mayor, formally express the City of Ottawa's support of the request of the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), the Local Authority Services (LAS), and the Municipal Finance Officers Association of Ontario (MFOA) to amend Ontario Regulation 438/97 (as amended) of the *Municipal Act, 2001* to allow municipalities to invest consistent with the Prudent Investor Standard, if those investments are professionally managed and part of a broader investment strategy, which includes The One Investment Program.

WHEREAS there is a requirement for four (4) additional emergency response vehicles to support the additional twelve (12) paramedics and staff has advised that there are sufficient funds in the Development Charge Paramedic Services account to accommodate the majority of the funding, with the remainder able to be accommodated within the City-wide Reserve Fund; and

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that, on the understanding that the review of Paramedic Services and future needs will be considered by Council prior to the development of the 2017 draft Operating and Capital Budgets, City Council approve:

- a) the addition of twelve (12) paramedics in 2016, with the part-year budget requirement of \$780,000 to be funded from the City's Provision for One-time and Unforeseen; and

WHEREAS such a requirement creates a procedural issue for City Council, as the Federal and Provincial requirement for confidentiality does not meet any of the statutory exemptions set out in the *Municipal Act, 2001*, for moving into closed session; and

WHEREAS both levels of government have indicated to staff that it is best that Council approve the final draft contribution agreements by resolution; and

WHEREAS there is a Council practice to address such issues, as noted in the 2010-2014 Governance Report, approved by City Council on December 8, 2010, as follows: "Council has indicated its desire to conduct more business in open session. Staff recommends building on the practice that has already been established to present staff reports that are written for public release, with legal opinions or other confidential information being provided as a separate addendum"; and

WHEREAS on March 11, 2016, Councillors were given the opportunity to review and provide comments on the confidential contribution agreements, in accordance with a Memorandum to Council from the General Manager, Infrastructure Services:

- 2. Request that the Provincial Government bring forward an amendment to the *Municipal Act, 2001* that would permit municipalities to enact a licensing by-law for payday loan establishments that could limit such establishments by location and number.

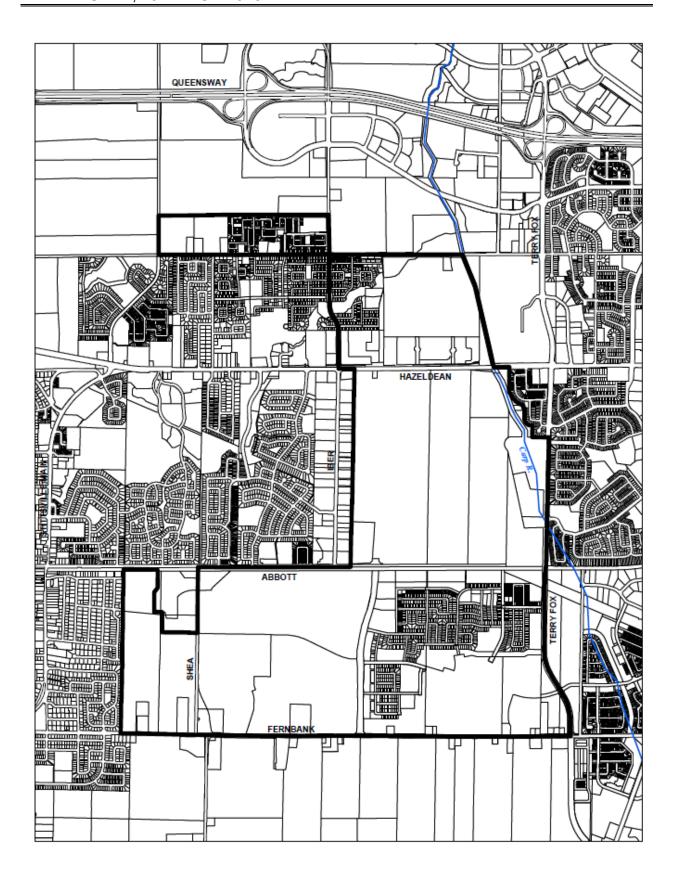
