**SUBJECT:** Commemorative Naming – Carol Parker Room – Greely Branch

**OBJET:** Nom commemorative – Salle Carol Parker – Succursale Greely

### REPORT RECOMMENDATION

That the Ottawa Public Library Board approve the proposal to name a room within the Greely Branch the "Carol Parker Room."

### **RECOMMANDATION DU RAPPORT**

Que le Conseil d'administration de la Bibliothèque publique d'Ottawa approuve la proposition de désignation de salle de la succursale Greely du nom de « salle Carol Parker ».

#### **BACKGROUND**

At its meeting of August 19, 2013, the Ottawa Public Library Board approved a recommendation to adopt the City's criteria and process for commemoratively naming OPL buildings or spaces within library buildings (including mobile units) as outlined in the City of Ottawa's Commemorative Naming Policy for Municipal Parks, Streets, and Facilities.

A commemorative name honours individuals who are (or have been) citizens of the City of Ottawa, or who have made a specific contribution to the City of Ottawa, and:

- Demonstrated excellence, courage or exceptional service to the citizens of the City of Ottawa, the Province of Ontario and / or Canada;
- Provided extensive community service, or who have an extraordinary community service record;
- Worked to foster equality and reduce discrimination;
- Where the nominated individual is a current City employee, the individual shall have made an outstanding contribution to the City of Ottawa outside of his/her capacity and duties as a City employee or they may be recognized for their exceptional service once they are no longer a City employee;
- The nominated individual has made a significant financial contribution to a park or facility and the contribution significantly benefits the community that the park or facility serves (i.e. the park or facility may not have otherwise been possible without the financial assistance);
- The nominated name has historical significance to the community, City of Ottawa, Province of Ontario, or Canada.

Any member of the public, including Board and Council members, may submit a name to the City for consideration. City staff review the name against other criteria and if there are no issues, forwards the nomination to the Commemorative Naming Committee ("CNC") for review of the formal application. Where the proposal is to name a Library facility, the CNC is comprised of the Library Chief Executive Officer and the Chair of the Ottawa Public Library Board, or their designates.

As part of the process, the CNC provides an initial approval based on the policy's criteria and the information provided by the nominator. City staff then ensure there is community support for the choice by initiating a 30-day public consultation phase.

Following the consultation process, the CNC reviews the public feedback and makes a final recommendation on the nomination, which is subsequently considered by the Ottawa Public Library Board. In cases where no public objections are received,

proposals may be brought directly to the Ottawa Public Library Board without the need for a second CNC meeting.

#### DISCUSSION

An application to commemorate Carol Parker was submitted by Rosalind Gilbert and Kim Mudge. Under the proposal, a room located at the Greely Branch would be named "Carol Parker Room."

The CNC met on to review the application and endorsed the proposed name under the following criterion:

 The nominated individual has provided extensive community service and has an extraordinary community service record.

Supporting information about Carol Parker is found in the attached Document 1.

#### **CONSULTATION**

An integral part of the Commemorative Naming Process is public consultation on the proposed name. On July 5, 2016, the City and the Ottawa Public Library announced a 30-day public consultation on the proposed name. The relevant information was communicated through a public service announcement and posted on Ottawa.ca.

The Clerk's office received three comments, all in favour of this proposal. (Held on file with the Chief Executive Officer)
