BRANCHLINGS.ALSO MORE THAN DOUBLED THE AMOUNT WE WERE ABLE TO GIFT TO THE LIBRARY EACH YEAR.IN 2016, THE AMOUNT GIFTED WAS \$350,000.THE FUNDS ARE USED BY THE LIBRARY TO PURCHASE ITEMS AND SUPPORT PROGRAM THAT WILLS COULD NOT OTHERWISE BE AFFORDED.FOR EACH OF ITS 33 BRANCHES.EACH BRANCH IS USUALLY ABLE TO PURCHASE SOMETHING WITH OPLA FUNDS EVERY YEAR.LARGER AMOUNTS ARE GIVEN IN SPECIAL CASES, SUCH AS RENOVATIONS.IN MY PARTICULAR CASE, IN THE WEST END, HAZELDEAN RECEIVED \$30,000 FOR RENOVATIONS IN 2012, AND BEAVERBROOK RECEIVED \$100,000 WHEN CONVERTED FROM A COMMUNITY TO A STACKED LIBRARY IN 2014.AT THE MOMENT, OPLA IS WORKING ON ITS LATEST AND LARGEST-EVER PROJECT.WE WILL BE ESTABLISHING A NEW BOOKSTORE IN THE NEW CENTRAL LIBRARY, WHICH WE HOPE WILL BE SHOWCASED ALONG WITH THE NEW CENTRAL LIBRARY ITSELF.FINALLY, I WOULD LIKE TO CIRCLE BACK TO THE MANY SENIORS WHO VOLUNTEER IN MANY DIFFERENT WAYS IN OUR COMMUNITY.IN LIBRARIES, AND IN HOSPITALS, IN SENIORS' AND YOUTH ORGANIZATIONS.LIVES GOES ON.TO ME. THAT DIDN'T MATERIALIZE. YOU THEN SUBSEQUENTLY HAD ANELECTION AND A COUNCIL THAT SETAS A DIRECTION A 2% TAX TARGET.SO AUTOMATICALLY THE LEVYDISCUSSION WAS FINISHED BECAUSEWE ACCOMMODATED WHAT WE NEEDEDTO -- AGREED TO THROUGH THE 2%.BUT YOU HAD SET A TARGET THATWAS CONTRARY TO WHAT WE HADRECOMMENDED THERE SO WE WENTWITH WHAT COUNCIL HAD DECIDED. As a minimum, if you give us nodirection with respect tocapital funding at all, this is the plan that I will follow.>> Okay.I followed the discussion alittle bit earlier with Councillor Nussbaum. If I make small repairs in myhome today, it will cost me lessthan it would cost if I were tohave to make major repairs downthe road. We are proposing to make smaller investments in repairs today than to do it more quickly. Do we have a sense of how muchthat is going to cost the futuretaxpayer of Ottawa? If we were to accelerate repairs today, through, for example, the addition of a smallinfrastructure levy, how much can we potentially save if wewere to accomplish the repairsin 7 years versus 10 or 5 yearsversus 10?>> Mr. Mayor, that's not a --that we have right now. Certainly something that we cancome back with. 2The plan that were puttingbefore you is a plan in terms ofhow we can continue to sustainour assets in a way that we canactually achieve progress. I think what we have seen hasbeen a significant shift interms of what we were previously seeing. We see a very different patternthis term. Part of that is attributed to the strategy in terms of how dowe get to a path of stabilityand predictability. That's going to allow us to allocate the investments tominimize the higher costinvestments in terms of makingsure that we replace

theshingles and do the resurfacing instead of having to rebuildpart of the roof or part of theroad. That's built into the plan. That's the element that we are trying to manage. We talked about infrastructurethat was built in the '50s to 80s. That's the wave we are trying tomanage and every cycle where weupdate this information, interms of -- the information thatwe provide is really based oncondition information. It's not based on strictpercentages. As we continue to maintain thoseinspection data, that we3continue to have updated information, we will be able toprovide updated information, we have time we refresh.>> If I can make it more specific, just in terms of beingable to communicate with theresidents of our ward, there areany number -- we had a longdiscussion and I am not going torevisit that today. If we develop this long rangeplan and there's any number ofroads in the ward that are wellpast the point of the state of repair that most consideracceptable. We know that in the next 5 to 7 years, those roads are not setfor resurfacings or rebuilds. Can I take the approval of thislong range financial plan backto residents and say this willaccelerate the reports or isthis very uncertain? If they are not in the plantoday, does accepting this planaccelerate that or are weuncertain?>> We need to increase investment levels that we are currently doing. The fact that you are approving report and a plan that shows an increase in investments certainly provides recognition to that fact. Basically going back to the discussion that we had at fedco. 4Right now, the focus is onhigher risk assets. So roads because they do carryhigher volumes of trafficHave high risk speeds. Which means that lower riskroads such as community streetsare not getting a higher levelof attention. As we progress through the plan, we will be able to startrediverting dollars to more ofthe local streets. First we need to make sure weare able to address the higherrisk roads and direct more funds to local. Can we say specifically which local streets will be done? That's not a level of detail at this point. What we can say, for theforeseeable future, we willcontinue to focus on the priority roads. As we refresh the cycles and aswe have been meeting to go overthe capital plan.>> With the short time I haveremaining, I would justencourage you to consider theresidential streets to be veryhigh risk. We have a number of conversations right now with lowvolume streets that because they are low volume are frequently used by cyclists. And there's one street that's not in the plan for a rebuild5any time soon or resurfacing where a neighbour has beenwatching multiple incidents of cyclists nearly getting hurt. The poor state of roads is onerisk to cars. It's a very different order of risk to cyclists because they are low volume. I will leave you with that. Thank you very much. >> Mayor Jim Watson: Thank you. On the report, carried? Dissent by Councillor Chiarelli. Thank you. Noted. Next is item 17. River Road speed reduction from Loewen Drive. Councillor Moffatt I believeheld this.>> Really goes back totransportation committee. I didn't get a chance at thetime. Four items on the agenda. And the three subsequent to thisone were held. The

councillors who put themforward had to explain. We carried this one quickly. Yet the other three had to beheld and rationale given to aswhy. This one does not need warrantseither.lt's -- I think the compliance ate is between 0 and 4% on that stretch of roadway. Yet this report seeks to lower6the limit. With the other reports, we allagree that no one knows ourwards better than ourselves. We don't know it like the councillor does. Given that we got the scrutiny given to three reports and each councillor worked on defendingthose reports and the effortthey put into them, it's onlyfair that we hear the rationalebehind this report, which also goes against staffrecommendations. If I can just get that. I couldn't do it at committee. After we carry it, there's no procedure to reconsider. This was the best option here. >> Mayor Jim Watson: Councillor Deans. >> I wanted to answer CouncillorMoffatt's question. We put this report forward to attempt to address the concernwith speeding along River Road. Since the opening of the VimyMemorial Bridge, my office hasreceived calls from residentsnoticing not only an increase intraffic volume but in the speedof vehicles coming into theneighbourhoods. This council agreed to spend awad of money widening LimebankRoad.What happened, traffic is likewater.What has happened is because7it's slightly shorter to thetake the scenic route, RiverRoad, the scenic route in thence's plan, they have beentaking that and speeding andreally having a very adverseimpact on the quality of life of the people in both Councillor Qagish's ward and my ward that live along that stretch. We have held a public meeting and met with community groups and through all discussions reducing the speed along RiverRoad has been their number oneobjective. While I support the initiative, I am concerned this report does not go far enough. It goes 60, 80, 60. But Councillor Qagish and I didnot agree on that particularitem. So we left it this way. But I think for the residents that have been severely impacted by the speed of traffic on that particular stretch of road, they would appreciate council'ssupport for this. Thank you. >> Mayor Jim Watson: Councillor Moffatt. >> Thank you, I think just aconcern. This is just to go back to something that we dealt with atcommittee. When you have these types oftlings, when the compliance rate8 is low, you need community buyin as well. I think -- I hope that you are both working with your communityto make sure they are complying. Clearly there's no compliance today on River Road. It would be misleading to suggest they will see a drastic reduction in speed with thischange. Which can be concerning. I think that's why we have therule on speed limitdesignations. Nevertheless, in those cases, with Councillor Darouze, therewas a big community push. You need that from your associations in order to achievecompliance. Otherwise it's reduced more. River Road is designed to acertain speed. Not to 60 kilometres per hour. Those are my concerns. It's important that you try towork with the community. It's a good opportunity to usesome of the traffic

calmingbudget that we have in order toaddress these things. When you change the limit inorder to achieve compliance, your ight want to invest in boardsor something rather than justchanging the signs. >> Councillor Darouze. >> Thank you, Mr. Mayor. I did dissent this at committee9because River Road, I know it's a nice road and people use itfor scenic road. Councillor Deans really saidthat. Every time -- if we reduce the speed on River Road, I don'tthink we really address theissue of speeders. If you reduce the speed, especially on River Road, youare going to increase the peoplecross over between lanes. We pave the road last year and of course, every time you pave aroad, you increase the speed. Every time we pave a nice roadand increase the speed, we areincreasing the risk of accident. And River Road seen lots oftragic accidents and not smallaccidents. Major accidents. People from Kemptville, people from my area, we all travel onthat road. By reducing it from 70, you arenot addressing the issue. We have traffic calmingmeasures. The issue needs to be moremonitored, more policing maybeon it by using speed board onthem. We use them in our community. The answer for River Road, ifyou look at inconsistent speedfrom River Road all the way downto Boundary it's soinconsistent.10I ask staff to look at reviewthe whole River Road and addressthe issue and make it all 60 or 70 or 80 but make up your mind. Stop reducing speed at specificcommunities. I cannot support that, because Ihave a similar situation southend of bridge. Not because only you open thebridge you create a problem. The problem is we pave the road, it's looking very nice now. And we widen it and it looksappealing for people driving onit 80 or 100. You increasing the risk. So for that, I don't think it's a wise idea to reduce the speedand if we really need to reduceit, we need to look at RiverRoad, all of it from beginning to end.>> Councillor Darouze, did youwant staff to address that?Staff?>> Through you, acting mayor, wedid a review of the corridor andthe appropriate speed based on he policy is 80 kilometres perhour. We don't go back and changelimits set by other councils at the time. They were set, 20, 25, 30 years ago. So unless there's a desire tocome forward with an appropriatelimit for the whole section, wewill leave the speed as they11are. There's a desire to reduce. We don't expect the speeds to bereduced unless we see increasedpolice enforcement. And that's sort of reflected inour comments in the report.>> Councillor Darouze.>>When you address the issue on the south end and the north end, did you notice the difference between the percent of the speeding in both sides? I ask you directly to review the whole River Road all the waydown. Can you tell me in specific swhere did you have an issue toreduce the speed or where do yousupport or don't support it?>> What we found were that thespeeds were in the 80 to 85kilometres per hour we sawreduction in areas there was abit more houses next to the --or by the park. The speeds were in the 80 to 85 kilometres per hour range andhence the recommendation that we provided back was that the

roadshould be 80 kilometres perhour. If we were to move forward withchanging it.>> The speed, if you reduce it, cannot -- going to help. The city will be making more liability. I don't think this is fair. This is not an inside street in 12 subdivisions. That road, you cannot drive at60.It's unrealistic. So we really would be creatingmore issue if we reduce thespeed and what's going to bringon us, ourselves and now we aregoing to be under pressure fromour residents to reduce the speed in every pocket area we have and if you drive RiverRoad, every half a kilometre, there is pocket of residential and we cannot be consistent. So I really -- I encourage mycolleagues not to support that. This is not a really good idea.>> Councillor Qagish.>> Thank you.I want to pick up on a fewpoints. Specifically on the buy in. I want to be clear on this. We have been working for thepast two years with thecommunity association to implement a bunch of trafficcalming measures. We are not doing this as a firstand last measure. Phil can speak to some of those. But we have done a bunch of different measures incollaboration with the localcommunity associations in myarea and Councillor Deans' areaas well. Including the median where thepaint lines are wider so there's 13 narrowing of the roads. So we bring down the speeds. If you look at the numbers, abit of success with that. You can see right after therepaving, numbers typically goup, and they have not. We brought down the left turningfrom the bridge into the peakhours in the morning so that people are encouraged to useLimebank.So we have done a bunch ofmeasures. This is not the first thing thatwe have done and we have broughtit here because a lot of theresidents in Honey Gables fronton to River Road. This is a fairly small stretchthat we are bringing down. You can read the report where Diane takes a poke at me about this. I don't agree about the partthat's further north where it's 80 because there's noresidential units there. But on the stretch I am lookingat, a lot of them have difficulttimes getting out of theirdriveways. Councillor Darouze is talkingabout the stretch south. I know it's not ideal to havethree different speeds alongRiver Road, but River Road is along load and the volumes thatyou see south of the bridge arenot the same as you see north of 14the bridge since we have opened. Most people are going northbound. The issues in Councillor Darouze's ward are different. I wanted to clarify these points for those who are not asfamiliar with River Road as wellas the dynamics in terms of thetraffic impacts. want to assure everyone thatwe have buy in.
