BACKGROUND

The inaugural Comprehensive Legal Services Report covering the first and second quarters of 2011 was approved by City Council on August 25th, 2011. A revised, quarterly report format originated from a Motion that was passed by Council on April 27th, 2011, that directed "the City Clerk and Solicitor to combine the existing Claims Settlements, Litigation Record and External Legal Costs reports into a single comprehensive report." On December 3rd, 2014, City Council approved an amendment to the Delegation of Authority Bylaw thereby revising the reporting requirement for these matters to a semi-annual basis. Therefore, the information provided herein is with respect to the first and second quarters of 2017.

DISCUSSION

Civil Litigation / Labour and Employment


In keeping with the format developed as part of the initial Comprehensive Legal Services Report, outlined below is the litigation record for the 2017 first and second quarters, as well as an overview of claims received and concluded in that same period.

The report also provides a breakdown of the range and volume of civil litigation currently being handled by the Legal Services Branch, as well as information on whether carriage of these matters rests with in-house legal staff or with external legal counsel.

(a) Labour Relations Unit

A summary of labour arbitrations for Q1 and Q2 is set out below in Figure 1.

Figure 1 - Labour Arbitration Outcomes




(b) Claims Unit

The Claims Unit received a total of 1,644 new claims in the first two quarters of 2017. This figure represents the 1,473 property damage claims and 171 personal injury claims that were filed with the Unit. Of the total number of new claims received during this period, 778 represent pothole claims, which is annually the most common type of claim received by the Unit.

A summary of the 1,644 claims received during the first and second quarters is set out below in Figure 2 by number.

The Claims Unit also concluded a total of 982 claims in the first two quarters of 2017. This figure represents the 806 property damage claims and 176 personal injury claims that were either closed-settled or closed-denied during this period. A summary of the

244 claims that were closed-settled (i.e. paid in whole or in part) during the first and second quarters is set out below in Figures 3 (by number) and 4 (by value).

Figure 3 - Claims Concluded Under \$100,000 by Number




Figure 4 - Claims Concluded Under \$100,000 by Value



The above-noted figures represent settlement of litigated and non-litigated claims, and include all costs borne by the City in finalizing a settlement, such as court costs, legal fees, investigative costs, etc. Furthermore, claim settlement payments include those made pursuant to negotiated settlements as well as any court-ordered damages. The details with regard to these claims are confidential in keeping with standard settlement practices. The specific circumstances and facts surrounding these confidential settlements are available to Members of Council from the Office of the City Clerk and Solicitor.

(c) Civil Litigation Unit

In the first and second quarters of 2017, 60 new Statements of Claim were received by the Legal Services Branch. With these, there are currently 393 outstanding civil proceedings against the City that are being addressed by the Branch. Of these open files, carriage of over 90% rests with the City's in-house Legal staff, with less than 10% of the remaining files having been referred to external counsel at either the direction of the City's insurer or due to the scope and/or complexity of the litigation.




Figure 6 - OMB Outcomes





Figure 7 - Other Administrative Outcomes

A summary of outcomes for civil litigation, Ontario Municipal Board ("OMB") and other administrative tribunals for Q1 and Q2 is set out below in Figures 5, 6 and 7.

Figure 5 - Civil Litigation Outcomes

The Legal Services Branch, in the first and second quarters of 2017, provided key legal support for various projects and strategic initiatives of the City within the current Term of Council Priorities. Some of the results of the varied services provided by in-house legal staff include the following:

projects and a variety of regulatory issues as well as assisting in drafting legal
agreements including LRT Tunnel Cell Service, PRESTO and the Smartcard Project.

- 2. <u>Ottawa Central Library Project</u>: Legal Services, in conjunction with external legal counsel, provides legal advice and guidance for ongoing legal matters related to the Central Library Project.
- 3. <u>Spring Flooding Response</u>: Legal Services provided legal advice in support of the City's emergency response to the spring flooding issues.



Planning and Development


In the first and second quarters of 2017, 369 individual agreements were received by the Development Law Unit for processing, of which there were 42 different types of agreements (i.e. Site Plan Agreement, Subdivision Agreement, Condominium Agreement, etc.). Of these 369 agreements, 91% were considered routine; 4% were considered moderately complex; and 4% were considered complex agreements. A summary of the agreements received is set out below in Figure 8 (by type).

The Development Law Unit also completed registration on 293 individual agreements in the first and second quarters of 2017. Of these 293 agreements registered, 74% were considered routine; 10% were considered moderately complex and 16% were considered complex. A summary of the agreements registered is set out below in Figure 9 (by type).
