REPORT RECOMMENDATIONS

That, at its meeting of November 4, 2019, the Board of Health for the City of Ottawa Health Unit:

1. Receive and table the 2020 Draft Operating Budget for the Ottawa Board of Health; and

2. Direct staff to forward the 2020 Draft Operating Budget for the Ottawa Board of Health to Ottawa City Council on November 6, 2019, as part of the City Council's tabling of the City of Ottawa 2020 Draft Operating and Capital budget; and

That, at its meeting of December 9, 2019, the Board of Health for the City of Ottawa Health Unit:

- 3. Approve the 2020 Draft Operating Budget for the Ottawa Board of Health;
- 4. Upon the Board of Health's approval of the 2020 Draft Operating Budget for the Ottawa Board of Health, direct staff to forward the report to Ottawa City Council, for consideration on December 11, 2019 as part of the City Council's approval of the City of Ottawa 2020 Draft Operating and Capital budget; and
- 5. Upon approval of the 2020 Draft Operating Budget for the Ottawa Board of Health by the Board of Health and Ottawa City Council, direct the Medical Officer of Health (or delegate), on behalf of the Board of Health, to forward the 2020 Annual Service Plan and Budget Submission, to the Ontario Ministry of Health (OMOH) for consideration based on the approved 2020 Operating Budget for the Ottawa Board of Health.

BACKGROUND

Improving Public Health and Well-being

The Ottawa Board of Health, through Ottawa Public Health (OPH), seeks to improve, respond to, and advocate for the health and well-being of Ottawa residents and ensure the effective delivery of public health programs and services. The public health unit's core functions are: population health assessment, surveillance, health promotion, disease and injury prevention, health protection and emergency preparedness and response.

The proposed operating budget for the Ottawa Board of Health reflects budget priorities for 2020, which aim to address community needs, support OPH's <u>strategic directions</u> and monitor programs and service outcomes to reflect and maximize the funding allotment OPH currently receives from its major funders – the Government of Ontario and the City of Ottawa. The budget was developed to ensure OPH meets provincial requirements, as outlined in the Ontario Public Health Standards: Requirements for Programs, Services and Accountability, the Organizational Requirements and the 2019 Public Health Funding and Accountability Agreement.

Delivering a Sustainable and Balanced Budget

Similar to other local health units and municipal and provincial government agencies, OPH has been operating within an increasingly fiscally constrained environment as population health needs grow faster than funding envelopes. As a means to address ongoing increased service demands accompanied by funding shortfalls, and to continuously improve, OPH has implemented regular administrative and operational program reviews, as well as a multi-year quality improvement plan in order to develop the 2020 budget.

Public Health Modernization

In releasing its 2019 budget, the Province announced its commitment to "modernizing public health" by establishing 10 regional public health units and 10 new regional boards of health with one governance model, replacing 35 local public health units and their corresponding boards of health, and to reduce the provincial share of public health funding by approximately \$200 million. As a result of initial feedback obtained following the original announcement, the provincial government has decided to conduct further consultations with technical working groups and appoint a Municipal Advisor, Jim Pine, to carry out more broad consultation with public health and municipal partners to inform the strengthening of the public health sector. These consultations are expected in the near future.

At a Glance: Budget 2019

Anticipating the possibility of a 0% increase from the province in 2019, which was confirmed in August 2019, and the need for a balanced budget, OPH undertook reviews of administrative and operational elements of its programs, worked with staff and partners to identify new innovative service delivery solutions, and prioritized program and community pressures. Final year-end results will be provided to the Board of Health in Quarter 1 of 2020, however budget projections are for a balanced budget.

OPH also continued to make investments in: immunization; the response to cannabis legalization, from both a health promotion and enforcement perspective; supervised consumption services; the establishment of the Ottawa Gambling Harms Prevention Network; and implementation of the OPH Reconcili-ACTION Plan, including Indigenous Cultural Safety Training across the organization. Responding to emergency situations and enhanced responses, such as the spring flood, and infection prevention and control responses, were also budget pressures.

Beyond preparing to manage uncertainty in provincial funding levels, the second largest risk OPH is addressing is the need to modernize OPH's information technology systems. The development of an electronic public health records (EPHR) system to enhance client engagement and service delivery continued to progress in 2019. In addition to enhanced service and measurement of outcomes, the EPHR system is also expected to provide efficiencies to the organization in the coming years.

DISCUSSION

2020 Draft Operating Budget for the Ottawa Board of Health

OPH has prepared estimates for the 2020 Draft Operating Budget for the Ottawa Board of Health in consultation with the City's Finance Department and in line with the City's guidelines for 2020 budget development, as outlined in the <u>Proposed 2020 Budget</u> <u>Direction, Timeline and Consultation Process</u>.

For 2020, OPH is presenting a draft balanced budget of \$73.7 million, which includes the provincial revenue of \$47.5 million, City of Ottawa contribution of \$22.9 million, and other sources of revenue totaling \$3.3 million.

The budget addresses ongoing and emerging needs for 2020, which include: cost of living and benefit adjustments determined by collective agreements; electronic public health record development and implementation costs; expenses associated with the implementation of cannabis legislation; Indigenous Communities Programming; and the new Seniors Dental Care Program.

The 2020 budget reflects a balanced approach based on the latest information provided by the Ministry and the City and assumes:

- 70% provincial /30% municipal funding for mandatory and related programs, with the exception of the Ontario Seniors Dental Care Program, Indigenous Communities Programming, the MOH/AMOH Compensation Initiative, AIDS Bureau Program and the Healthy Babies Healthy Children Program, all of which will be funded 100 percent by the province;
- City program support costs of approximately \$9M are factored in the calculation of the cost-sharing formula;
- Provincial funding for existing programs will not change from 2019 levels;
- The city will contribute an additional \$475K;
- All new growth initiatives presented are provincially-funded at 100% and
- Program / administrative efficiencies of \$1.355M will be generated from the OPH budget through process / procurement improvements such as obtaining competitive pricing on expiring contracts, implementing e-modules for educational programs previously delivered in person, and reductions in professional services, advertising and program supplies.

As part of the budget assumptions, and specifically related to finding program efficiencies, OPH undertook a review of all existing programs in order to achieve savings to balance the budget. Employees at all levels were asked to provide input in various forms. Ideas were then evaluated and decided upon based on the OPH strategic plan and the following guiding principles:

- Reduce negative impacts on the health of the public and vulnerable populations;
- Focus on local Ottawa needs, unique functions only offered by public health, and protect resources dedicated to directions/goals in the strategic plan;
- Focus on programs and services that are supported by evidence and are costeffective while committing to evaluate/monitor changes where there is a lack of evidence of the best way forward;
- Minimize impact on client/citizen experience when interacting with OPH;
- Minimize impact on employees, performance, and safety culture;
- Examine back office and administrative activities and use more technology, including electronic public health records.

The ideas and options included for consideration in this draft budget reflect leadership's direction to continuously improve and deliver value for money invested, while limiting impacts on the health and wellbeing of residents and visitors in Ottawa as services are adjusted.

OPH will continue to work with provincial partners to identify areas to strengthen the impact of resources invested in the public health system across the province, through decreased duplication and by leveraging different centres of expertise.

As well, over time, OPH will make the case for increased funding for public health initiatives, as the demands from population growth and the value of investing in prevention in the healthcare system support revenue growth.

CONSULTATION

Following the tabling of the 2020 Draft Operating Budget for the Ottawa Board of Health at the November 4, 2019 Board of Health meeting, the budget report will be tabled at

the November 6, 2019 Council meeting. The Board will consider the budget for approval at its next meeting on December 9, 2019 and submit it to Council on December 11, 2019 as part of the 2020 Budget process.
