Officer Cahill arrived with his partner and showed terrific professionalism in helping to resolve the tensions. As a victim of the complaint, I would like to commend his calm, reasoned, and unbiased behaviour in helping to resolve the matter. I believe his behaviour should be the standard when dealing with the public and I would like for him to be acknowledged for this professionalism.

Excerpt from letter: While working as frontline staff at a men's shelter, a client was found

unresponsive after suffering from a drug overdose. While searching the client's belongings, I was stuck by a used needle, despite wearing needle-resistant safety gloves and following all safety protocols. I sought medical attention at a hospital and Cst. Leslie McCarthy and Cst. Jose Barahona arrived to check on how I was doing. They stayed with me and displayed genuine concern for my well-being, as well as empathy for what I was coping with. They were adamant that they would not leave me alone at the hospital until I had someone come wait with me for support. After informing me that a co-worker was on their way, Cst. Barahona contacted the 911 call center to ask that any calls for service from the shelter be given priority as it would be short-staffed. I also witnessed both officers field numerous questions from other patients in the waiting room. Both were very approachable and professional while they listened attentively to the questions posed to them. Cst. McCarthy followed up a week later to see how I was doing. I believe the actions of Cst. McCarthy and Cst. Barahona during the course of that night, especially while at the hospital, displayed a true reflection of the Ottawa Police Services motto 'Community Service Communautaire.' The two officers not only provided me with the feeling of support, but also showed a desire go above and beyond what would be expected in the performance of their duties. They displayed genuine concern, empathy, and willingness to help.

They brought me to the hospital where I recovered, after being in the acute monitoring unit for four days, strapped to a bed. I'm really thankful that they did not choose to go another route, even though I was clearly out of control and saying a lot of things that could have elicited a more violent response, or jail. I only remember one officer's last name due to the state I was in and it was Albright. She was female, and used a ridiculous amount of control with me and never once said anything rude back. I think at the very least they deserve some sort of compliment and to know that I am thankful to them for dealing with me so professionally and for seeing that I was not myself. Obviously it wasn't a

good experience and I generally don't like many of the police officers I have run into, but I wanted to say thank you and let them know they made a difference in my life that has made me change how I feel about the police. I still think about how that night could have went differently and I am grateful.

She suggested I complete a stolen car report, which I did, and to contact my insurance company right away. Later, I received a call from Cst. O'Reilly who informed me my car was found on Metcalfe Street. He stayed with my car until I arrived, to prevent another parking ticket - it had three tickets on it already totalling \$300! My car was not stolen, but it had been towed. All the parking tickets were forgiven. During this stressful time, Cst. O'Reilly and Cst. Seguin were sympathetic, displayed genuine concern, and gave words of encouragement and helpful advice. These fine officers are a credit to the Ottawa Police Service.
